We also **celebrate that ECM is growing**. This fall, ECM hired two new Community Health Workers. We are in the process of hiring three more case managers and CHW's for new projects around Emergency Rental Assistance, Family Stability in housing, and a Community Mobile Resource Trailer that will go to schools, parks, and events to engage people out in the neighborhood. In each of these new programs, it was people at the City, United Way, and the DA's office who reached out to us because of ECM's experience and reputation of being a solid partner in our community development work.



The good news goes on! Our Common Good Thrift store is exceeding expectations in its sales growth and its number of happy customers and volunteers, and we have a new fantastic Board of Directors who are helping with vision and long-term ECM growth and health.

These are just a few of all the good areas that we choose to highlight and celebrate in the life of this organization. I continued to be honored and humbled to be leading ECM as a dynamic part of the life of our neighbors in the International District.

Vaccine Clinics



Our One Hope Centro de Vida health center has played a huge role in the health of the International District community for the last 12 years. When the pandemic became a reality, our mission did not change, and we continued through telehealth appointments, phone call check-ins, and community care for Covid patients. One Hope opened its doors for in-person medical and dental appointments again early this spring and we have expanded our services to include **Health Literacy training and Covid vaccine clinics**. In partnership with the Department of Health, we have held four vaccine clin-

ics in the last few months, offering Pfizer shots, including the booster shot. In addition to the shot clinics, we have provided Covid health education to over 200 people. We are well-placed in our community and have the cultural and linguistic knowledge necessary to answer their questions and concerns regarding Covid and the vaccine. We will see our community through this pandemic, and we are thankful for your support!

Congratulations and Thank You Sam!

ECM is thrilled to have partnered with Sam Loustaunau these past few months as he worked to complete his Eagle Scout project. Sam's idea was to create literacy bags for pre-school and elementary children in the International District. He met with our staff, learned a bit about community, and spent hours and hours reading, selecting, and compiling age appropriate books for kids. The project culminated in Sam giving ECM **240 bags**, filled with books in English, Spanish, Navajo, Chinese, Arabic, and Vietnamese, that will go to kids and families in our community.

courtyard to celebrate a collaborative project creating energy efficiency upgrades for homes within low income communities. For several weeks prior to this event, two local organizations, Prosperity Works and Energy Works,

were working on practical energy efficiency upgrades on our 13 homes at Casa Shalom with Federal and NM State grants.

ECM, Casa Shalom, and our neighbors turned out in force at this press event to celebrate

our accomplishments and talk to the press and the political officials. Those in attendance were able go into Casa Shalom Coordinator Ruben Duran's apartment and witness the installation of an energy efficient split unit, an affordable, ductless heating and cooling system. Our goal at Casa Shalom is to eventually convert all our homes with these electric split units and participate in a community solar project to actively work toward environmental health.
